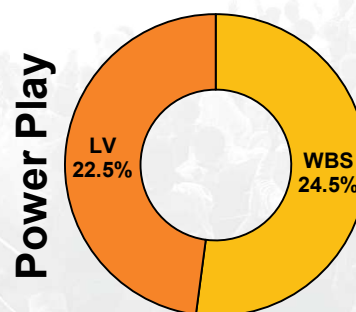
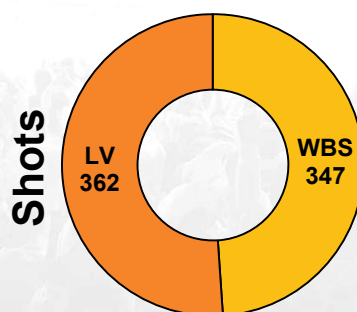
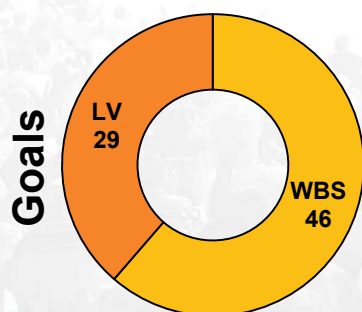

OCT. 18 - LV 3 at WBS 4

The Penguins unloaded four goals in the first period, including a pair from Boris Katchouk. However, the Phantoms made them sweat by eventually clawing back within one.

NOV. 6 - LV 1 at WBS 2 (OT)

Wilkes-Barre/Scranton failed to score on a power play in overtime, but while the teams were skating a four-on-four, Tristan Broz picked the top corner to win the game.

NOV. 13 - WBS 3 at LV 4 (OT)

Owen Pickering scored his first pro goal with 5:27 left in regulation, giving the Penguins a 3-2 lead. Once again, Lehigh Valley rallied, then won on an Olle Lycksell power-play goal in OT.

DEC. 27 - LV 2 at WBS 3

Rutger McGroarty set up Tristan Broz twice, and Vasily Ponomarev scored 43 seconds into the third period as the Penguins used steady scoring to survive a tight scrap at home.

FEB. 14 - LV 3 at WBS 2 (SO)

The Phantoms tied the game with a power-play goal in the third period. After an unfruitful overtime, Rodrigo Ábols notched the only goal for either team in the shootout.

MAR. 14 - WBS 1 at LV 3

The Phantoms had five power-play opportunities, gave up a shorthanded goal, but scored on one. Wilkes-Barre/Scranton failed to convert on any of its four man advantages, including a long five-on-three in the third.

OCT. 19 - WBS 3 at LV 0

Lehigh Valley continued its pressure from the night before, but Filip Larsson stonewalled the Phantoms with a 41-save shutout.

NOV. 8 - WBS 3 at LV 5

The Penguins seized a 2-0 lead on power-play and shorthanded goals in the first frame, but the Phantoms pulled even early in the second. Three unanswered goals by Lehigh Valley erased another WBS lead and led to victory.

DEC. 21 - LV 2 at WBS 7

Wilkes-Barre/Scranton's line of Ville Koivunen, Boris Katchouk and Emil Bemström combined for eight points in a dominant showing. The two rivals combined for 132 penalty minutes, and both head coaches were ejected.

JAN. 26 - LV 1 at WBS 5

Emil Bemström scored a hat trick, and Ville Koivunen assisted on all three goals. Four of the six combined goals in the game came on the man advantage.

FEB. 16 - WBS 4 at LV 3

The two teams traded goals back-and-forth consistently through regulation, but Joel Blomqvist stepped up with 31 sparkling saves for his side to land the win in regulation.

MAR. 16 - WBS 5 at LV 3

The Penguins built a two-goal lead before the game was three-and-a-half minutes old, but the Phantoms tied the game twice. Valtteri Puustinen lit the lamp with 3:36 remaining for the game-winner in the series finale.

2024-25 SEASON IN REVIEW

A LOOK BACK AT SOME OF THE MOST IMPORTANT ASPECTS OF THE PENGUINS' REGULAR SEASON

“A NEW ERA” • After last spring's premature exit from the postseason, a summer of change swept through the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins. Jason Spezza took the helm as general manager, Amanda Kessel joined the fray director of minor league operations, and Kirk MacDonald became the 12th head coach in team history. MacDonald quickly put his fingerprints on his new club, introducing a high-octane offensive philosophy to go along with an intense, matter-of-fact temperament. Significant roster turnover came in the wake of these personnel changes, too. Only nine players who skated for the Penguins in last year's playoffs are still on the team's roster for Game 1 of this postseason.

YOUTH MOVEMENT • When the 2024-25 regular season began, Wilkes-Barre/Scranton rolled out one of its youngest opening-night rosters in recent memory. The team had an average age of 24.3 years old, but that wasn't by accident. The Penguins received an influx of high-profile draft picks or trade acquisitions for this season. Immediately, those young players were thrust into significant roles on the team and did not disappoint. Ville Koivunen, 21, led the team with 35 assists and 56 points. Tristan Broz, 22, logged 19 goals. Owen Pickering, 21, represented the team at the 2025 AHL All-Star Classic. Rutger McGroarty, 21, may not have been on the team's opening-night roster, but he did develop into an all-situations savant for Wilkes-Barre/Scranton before a second recall to Pittsburgh in late March. Sergei Murashov, 21, dazzled in net and started his AHL career 11-0-0, tying the Penguins' franchise record for longest win streak in the process.

FRESH STARTS, MUSHY MIDDLES • Wilkes-Barre/Scranton was the best first-period team in the league this season, and it earned that title in undisputed fashion. The Penguins out-scored opponents 91-55 (+36) in first periods, the best goal differential by any team in any period. Only one other club managed to reach 80 goals in the opening frame (Tucson). Wilkes-Barre/Scranton's 91 first-period tallies placed second in franchise history behind the 2010-11 squad (97), but that team had an 80-game regular season as opposed to this year's 72 contests. Furthermore, the Penguins scored in the first five minutes of a game 19 times this season. But for as good as the team was at starting hot, the second period often let opponents back into games. Wilkes-Barre/Scranton was out-scored 64-75 (-11) in second periods, the second-worst goal differential among Eastern Conference playoff teams.

RECORD POWER PLAY • The Penguins' power play set a franchise record this season, finishing the year at 21.3%. It took a while for the group to find its footing on the man advantage, as it ranked 23rd overall at Thanksgiving. However, the turnaround started in a come-from-behind win over the Laval Rocket at home on Nov. 29, coincidentally assistant coach Nick Luukko's birthday. Luukko coordinated Wilkes-Barre/Scranton's man advantage to its franchise-record conversion rate and the fourth-best mark in the league. This success came despite constant alterations to the team's power-play personnel due to injuries, trades, or NHL recalls. As for what players populate the team's "top" power play, MacDonald established early in his tenure that whichever unit scores the most recent power-play goal gets first dibs to start the next man-advantage opportunity.

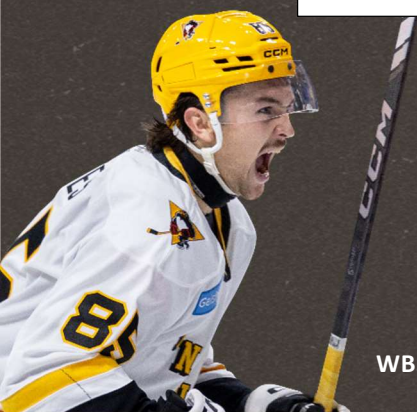

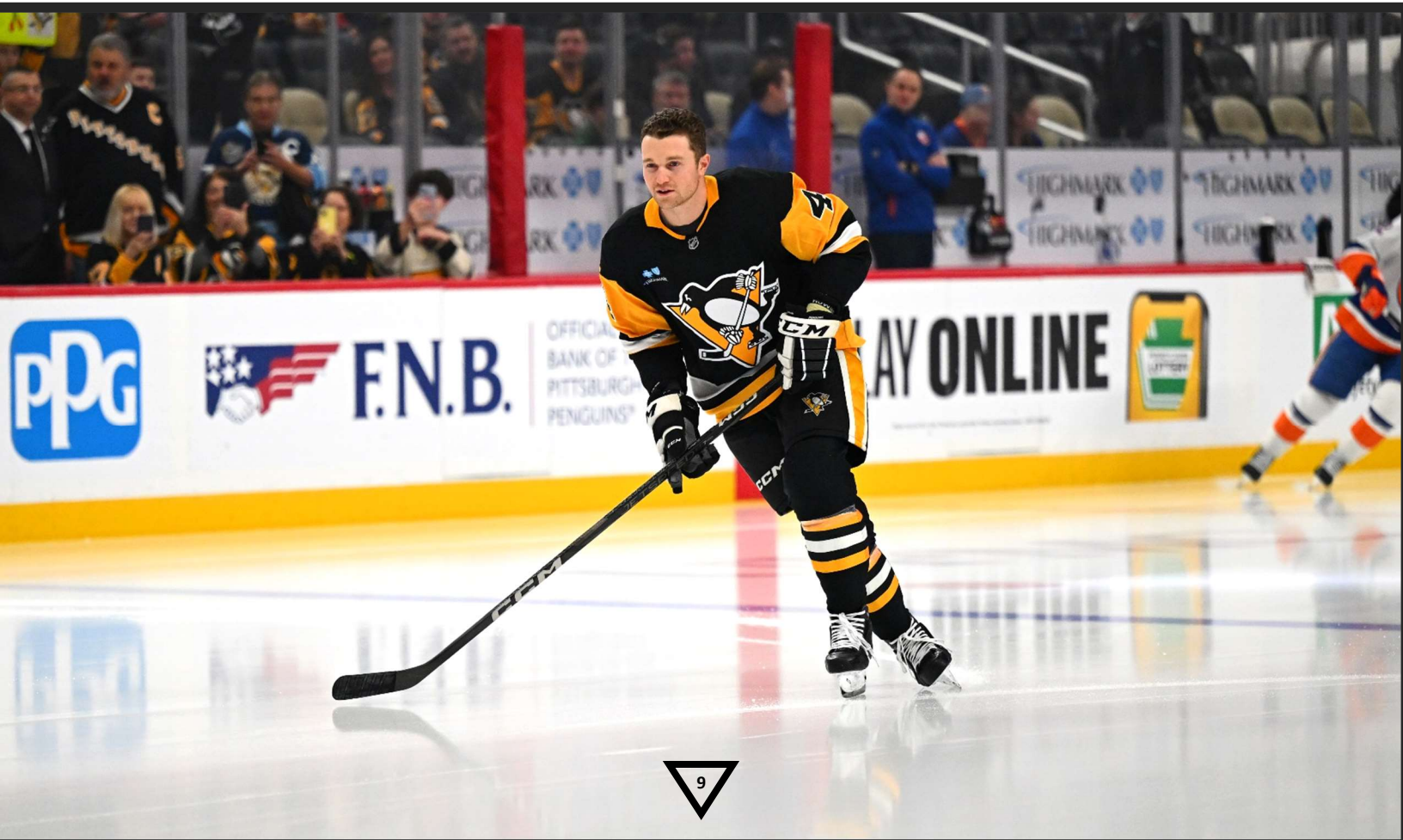

PENGUINS vs. PHANTOMS

“PAYBACK”

They say revenge is a dish best served cold. This week, the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins hope that they serve it on ice.

Wilkes-Barre/Scranton is set to take on the Lehigh Valley Phantoms in the best-of-three opening round of the 2025 Calder Cup Playoffs. This is the second-straight year that the Penguins and Phantoms have met at the start of the postseason. Last time around, things went Lehigh Valley's way.

The Phantoms, who entered the 2024 playoffs with more losses than wins, took Game 1 from the Penguins at Mohegan Arena at Casey Plaza last year. The two turnpike rivals followed that up with a hectic Game 2 at PPL Center, a contest that ended with Lehigh Valley standing tall in overtime.

An offseason of change arrived in the wake of the Penguins' stunning, premature exit from the postseason, and now the new-look club is determined to avenge that loss. There are many new faces involved in this year's opening-round rematch, including first-year head coach Kirk MacDonald.

It didn't take long for MacDonald and his team to engage in the long rivalry between the Penguins and Phantoms. Several spirited, physical bouts populated the first half of their 12-game season series, the most notable of which was a Dec. 21 clash that saw the animosity on the ice extend to the benches, as well. That night, after a power-play goal by the Penguins, Lehigh Valley head coach Ian Laperrière engaged in a shouting match with MacDonald. Their verbal sparring led to ejections for both bench bosses with three and a half minutes left to play in a game that featured 134 combined penalty minutes.

"I think when you play a team 12 times, you probably don't like each other, right?" MacDonald said rhetorically on the eve of the series. "There's definitely some animosity to these games. It kind of makes it more fun, in my opinion. Everyone's going to be juiced on both sides of this one."

For what it's worth, there was never another coach-on-coach incident in the six matchups that followed.

MacDonald's team owned the season series, going 8-2-1-1 against the Phantoms. The Black & Gold outscored the Orange & Black 42-29 across the 12-game series, and Wilkes-Barre/Scranton went 5-0-0-1 at home.

However, the Penguins learned the hard lesson that regular-season dominance doesn't always translate to postseason success in last year's clash with the Phantoms. Wilkes-Barre/Scranton went 8-1-2-1 against Lehigh Valley during the 2023-24 season, only to lose in the playoffs. Both playoff games were tight, decided by one goal, but that is hardly any consolation when you're the group going home earlier than anyone expected.

Last spring's series was the first time Wilkes-Barre/Scranton and Lehigh Valley met in the playoffs since the Phantoms franchise relocated to Allentown in 2014, but they engaged in four storied playoff series back when the Philadelphia Flyers' primary affiliate shared the scene in the City of Brotherly Love. Those series between the Penguins and Philadelphia Phantoms created several iconic moments, from the exhilaration of Andy Chiodo's center-ice fight with Antero Niittymäki to the heartbreak of allowing six unanswered, third-period goals to lose a multi-goal lead. That rally led by Mike Richards and Jeff Carter in 2005 marked Philadelphia's only series win over Wilkes-Barre/Scranton, while the Penguins triumphed in 2001, 2004 and 2008.

In this installment, a fast start to the series is paramount, considering how quickly the best-of-three format can pass one by. The Penguins were surprisingly lackluster when starting a new week, going 8-8-2-0 when playing on three or more days' worth of rest. They were 7-4-2-0 on Wednesdays. The Phantoms were 9-1-1-0 in their Wednesday games.

Another thing to closely monitor in this series will be the potential impact on special teams. Wilkes-Barre/Scranton set a franchise record this season with its 21.3% power play, but in games against Lehigh Valley, both clubs were humming on the man advantage. The Penguins went 24.5% on the power play during the season series. The Phantoms were 22.5% on their power plays against the Penguins, well above their overall average of 17.3%. Furthermore, Lehigh Valley was the fifth-most penalized team in the AHL with 1046 penalty minutes.

"There's going to be power plays, but we can't get caught in a seven-to-nine power play opportunities per team kind of game where there's no five-on-five," MacDonald said. "Throughout the course of the year, there's been games where they've tried to get us off our game with after-the-whistle stuff. We just have to be smart with that. Retaliatory penalties – this time of year – they get amplified, especially in such a short series."

So the stage is set. Starting with Wednesday's Game 1, another potentially cutthroat series between Wilkes-Barre/Scranton and Lehigh Valley takes top billing for playoff hockey in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Will the Penguins deliver stone-cold retribution? Or will the Phantoms haunt them again?

THE STORY OF THE CALDER CUP

FROM THE AMERICAN HOCKEY LEAGUE GUIDE AND RECORD BOOK

The coveted Calder Cup has been a motivational force for American Hockey League teams throughout the League's 89-year history. It is one of our sport's greatest challenges and ultimate honors to hoist the Calder Cup in victory.

The trophy is named for Frank Calder, who served as the National Hockey League's first President from 1917 to 1943. During the 1920's, Mr. Calder was instrumental in guiding hockey into the mainstream of America's major cities including Boston, New York, Detroit and Chicago, while helping in the formation of the American League.

The Calder Cup trophy itself was actually first awarded in 1938 to the Providence Reds for winning the second International-American Hockey League championship. (In 1996, George Parsons of the Syracuse Stars was presented the Calder Cup in a ceremony at the Onondaga County War Memorial, as it is believed the Stars never received a trophy for their 1937 championship.)

In 2001, the trophy's base was changed to include two tiers of plaques, which feature the rosters of each of the last 20 Calder Cup champions; the plaques from all previous champions are on display in the Hockey Hall of Fame in Toronto. The entire Calder Cup trophy now stands 24 inches tall and weighs 35 pounds. The bowl, made of sterling silver, is 12 inches high and eight inches in diameter. The hardwood base is made of Brazilian mahogany.

A total of 32 different cities have had their AHL member club win the Calder Cup, led by Hershey with 13 and Cleveland with 10 following the Lake Erie Monsters' 2016 championship. Springfield (seven), Rochester (six), Providence (five) and Chicago (three) are the other active cities with more than one title. Twenty-nine members of the Hockey Hall of Fame have won the Calder Cup in their careers, including Johnny Bower, Terry Sawchuk, Emile Francis, Gerry Cheevers, Al Arbour, Andy Bathgate, Larry Robinson, Doug Harvey, Patrick Roy and 2013 inductee Fred Shero.

Not only have great players won the Calder Cup, but outstanding coaches have also hoisted the AHL's championship trophy. Hall of Famer Fred "Bun" Cook holds the distinction of winning seven Calder Cups in his career; no other AHL head coach has ever won more than three. Current NHL head coaches with Calder Cup titles on their resumes include Barry Trotz (Portland, 1994), John Tortorella (Rochester, 1996), Peter Laviolette (Providence, 1999), Todd McLellan (Houston, 2003), Bruce Boudreau (Hershey, 2006), Jon Cooper (Norfolk, 2012), Jeff Blashill (Grand Rapids, 2013), Willie Desjardins (Texas, 2014) and Jared Bednar (Lake Erie, 2016).

More than 100 players and coaches have won both the Calder Cup and Stanley Cup in their careers, including Ace Bailey, Brian Engblom, Dick Gamble, Butch Goring, Adam Graves, Peter Mahovlich, Kirk Maltby, Ab McDonald, Patrick Sharp, Fred Shero, Brian Skrudland, Jeff Carter and Mike Richards.

Two-time Calder Cup champion Darren Haydar is the AHL's all-time leader in playoff goals (63), assists (80) and points (143), and three-time winner Bryan Helmer has played in more Calder Cup Playoff games (159) than anyone else. Marcel Paille's 49 playoff victories are the most ever by a goaltender, and Bill McDougall set single-season records that may never be broken when he tallied 26 goals, 26 assists and 52 points during the 1993 postseason with the Cape Breton Oilers.

Four men share the honor of having won the most Calder Cups during their playing careers: Bob Solinger, Les Duff, Fred Glover and Mike Busniuk each skated to five titles.

Calder Cup-winning teams have impacted significantly on the success of their NHL parent clubs. On three occasions an AHL club and its NHL affiliate won their league championships in the same year: In 1976 and 1977, the Montreal Canadiens won the Stanley Cup while their AHL affiliate, the Nova Scotia Voyageurs, won the Calder Cup, and in 1995, the Stanley Cup champion New Jersey Devils saw their AHL affiliate, the Albany River Rats, win a title as well. In 2008, the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins and their parent club in Pittsburgh both reached their respective league Finals before bowing out, and in 2015, both the New York Rangers and Hartford Wolf Pack reached the conference finals.

Only one team in 80 years has been able to win the Calder Cup in three consecutive seasons: the Springfield Indians, under the leadership of AHL and Hockey Hall of Famers Eddie Shore and Jack Butterfield, skated to Calder Cup championships in 1960, 1961 and 1962.
